Committee News

Re-vamp 1RPH Constitution

Sparke Helmore, an ACT law firm, has offered pro bono to provide a draft Constitution in accordance with the ACT Government's Model Rules for Constitutions for not-for-profit organisations.

The Constitution are the rules for the organisation, and this redraft allows members to voice their opinions on what they want to see in the Constitution. Some concerns were raised at our recent meeting, particularly in relation to representation on the Committee of volunteer readers and presenters.

Special Meeting 25 June 2022 At a Special Meeting on 25 June 2022, members voted for rolling twoyear terms for Committee members; a restructure of the Committee to separate the operational side from the strategic management and the substitution (where appropriate) of the term "with a print disability" in place of print Handicapped.

The amendments dealing with the restructuring of the Committee left open how the new station arrangements would operate. These details need to be worked out, and a discussion on roles by those volunteers actively engaged in managing the station is suggested with recommendations to the Committee.

Grants 2022 - 2023

Community Broadcasting Foundation (CBF)

In early June, we received advice that our Application for CBF R1 2022/23 Development & Operations Grant was successful.

Our application was one of 129, requesting a total of \$8,467,924. In this round, 92 applications were supported with a combined total of \$4,297,514.

Radio1RPH has been offered a grant of \$117,920 + GST for Radio 1RPH Transmission and Operational Expenses (D&O – 01399)

This is comprised of

\$26,178.00 Transmission operational costs \$64,704 Salaries, technical support

\$21,296.00 Other Operational Costs \$3,000.00 Other Training activities \$1,742.00Transmission equipment

\$1,000.00 Grant admin

\$117,920 TOTAL

This is the largest grant we have received through the CBF and is very welcome.

Important COVID-19 Update

COVID has now resurfaced - 1RPH COVID Safety Precautions

Volunteers and Members are advised to restrict your visits to the Station for rostered and/or recording sessions only. If you can record at home, then you should do so. If you need recording equipment to assist you with recording at home or advice on how to do so, please get in touch with Roy Jeeves at the Station.

Our primary goal is to seek to protect you as much as possible but keep the Station on air. To assist us, you are requested to observe social distancing, wash your hands, and use the disinfectant provided. We also request that you wipe down any benches, light switches, and door handles at the beginning and/or end of your shifts. Tissues should be placed over the microphone socks. Materials for these purposes will be provided.

If you are feeling unwell: you should stay home. If you are rostered to read or present and feel unwell, you should advise Roy or your contact, either the presenter or your colleagues, as soon as possible. If you test positive, please notify us as soon as possible.

If you have to isolate: according to current ACT Government guidelines, tell the Station Coordinator; if you're a reader, tell your presenter on the shift (or vice versa); and if possible, contact your fellow volunteers to arrange a swap or replacement. Copy in all relevant contacts.

Emergency: If you are available and/or willing to fill in an emergency vacancy, please advise Roy Jeeves or your roster contact.

Pre-recorded programs and book readings: If you are unwell and unable to prepare your program or your chapter readings promptly, advise the program team so the necessary broadcasting adjustments can be made.

Facemasks: It is pleasing to note that volunteers have been adhering to the mandatory indoor face mask requirements that were reintroduced by the ACT Government in late December while at the Station. Please read the current rules relating to the safety required within the <u>ACT</u>.

Unvaccinated: Should you be unvaccinated; we request that you advise Roy Jeeves and or the rosterers for the live reading programs in case any additional and or specific precautions for your safety is required.

Vale Neville Kerr

Many of you will be saddened to hear of the death of Neville Kerr. Neville died peacefully in hospital overnight on 26-27 May, after a long struggle with Parkinson's Disease. Neville was 82 years of age and is survived by his partner, Tricia.

Over many years, Neville was a major contributor to the work of Blind Citizens Australia, beginning in the days when it was the National Federation of Blind Citizens of Australia, and to the Radio for the Print Handicapped movement, particularly through his work with the establishment and ongoing functioning of 3RPH Melbourne.

Neville produced and presented more than 1100 editions of BCA's weekly radio program, then called Horizons, and was heavily involved with the recording and broadcast production of material from BCA conventions and other major events. In the late 1980s, Neville was a key member of the working party that successfully negotiated the MoU that provided for BCA's support of the broadcast licence application submitted to the then Australian Broadcasting Authority by the Association for the Blind.

Neville's involvement with the establishment of Melbourne's RPH service started in the 1970s, when the blind and vision impaired community first recognised the potential of Radio to meet the information needs of the Print handicapped community. He was heavily involved with establishing 3RPH's first studios in Prahran and became a regular program host and presenter. He continued this role every week until around 2005.

Neville also served on the Association for the Blind (now Vision Australia) board for around five years in the late 80s early 90s. He had a keen interest in music and was an accomplished carpenter.

Above all, Neville recognised that Radio could provide access to many forms of information for blind or vision impaired people. Neville's broadcasting style was well ahead of its time, with the provision of descriptive coverage of many major events, including the first illumination of the Melbourne Cricket Ground following the installation of lighting towers and the world-renowned Christmas window displays at the Myer store in Bourke Street Melbourne. Neville's foresight and innovation with this form of broadcasting led to the provision of Audio Description of Australian Television drama, broadcast by RPH, leading to the wider availability of Audio Description in live theatre, galleries, and other places of public interest. While always reluctant to put himself forward as a leader, Neville Kerr's contribution to improving the lives of blind or vision impaired Australians through innovative information provision is without peer.

Neville was recognised for this contribution in 2003 when he was the recipient of BCA's David Blyth Award. The Award citation reads:

"In recognition of his outstanding contribution as a pioneer in radio for the print handicapped broadcasting and programming; as an innovator in the use of radio to meet the information needs of blind people; and as the producer and host of over 1000 editions of BCAs national weekly radio program Horizons."

This week's episode of New Horizons, BCA's weekly radio program and podcast, will be dedicated to further reflections on Neville Kerr's life and work. Details about funeral arrangements can be obtained by calling BCA on 1800033660.
